Dedication, and Service




Remembering James Darnell Davis (J.D.)

James Darnell Davis, affectionately known as J.D., was born in the heart of Eastern Arkansas, St. Francis County, near Forrest City on the historic Gram Farm. From humble beginnings, J.D. led a life marked by exceptional curiosity, unyielding discipline, and a passion for lifelong learning. His story is one of perseverance, achievement, and a deep commitment to uplifting others.


Roots in Rural Arkansas

Growing up in a sharecropping family, J.D. balanced his early education with the demanding work of the fields. Even as a child, he helped his family with the rigors of





J.D.'s professional career stands as a beacon of inspiration in the world of aerospace technology. His tenure with Automated Space Group (ASG) and TRW placed him at the forefront of innovative scientific developments. He was a key contributor to the design and realization of the Hubble Space Telescope, one of humanity's greatest scientific instruments.
